

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

Below are 5 features of John's life which can offer us something for our lives today.

God calls John

God knew exactly when John needed to be born, though it didn't make sense to his parents at the time, Elizabeth and Zechariah. But God had a purpose for John. He knew that John needed to be the forerunner of Christ at this specific time in history. He even planned the family John was born into, being a relative to Jesus himself! In that very significant visit of Mary to Elizabeth's home to announce her own miraculous pregnancy, the Bible says that "the baby leaped in her womb and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit" (Luke 1:41). Even before his birth, John's purpose was being aligned. God was calling.

God has a specific calling and purpose for our lives today.

John was obedient

Zechariah had a time of doubting, but ultimately embraced the clear calling on John's life and honored the words given to him and Elizabeth by the angel Gabriel. The Bible says Zechariah prophesied these words over his precious child, "And you my child, will be called a prophet of the Most High, for you will go on before the Lord to prepare the way for him, to give his people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins..." (Luke 1:76-77) The passage goes on to say that John "...grew and became strong in spirit and he lived in the desert until he appeared publicly to Israel" (v. 80). John stepped in to his calling and led a life of obedience. He took time to grow spiritually and to focus on God to prepare for his ministry. In doing so he was able to speak with great passion and clarity for the people of that day.

We are invited to join in with what God is doing, despite our weaknesses.

John walked in the desert

John embraced a simple life, as already alluded to. He lived off locusts and wild honey and wore the most basic of clothing. He lived in the desert. It can't have been easy. And yet the clarity of his call and the strength of the Lord enabled him to survive and live in these conditions. Because whilst it wasn't easy, there was nothing else to distract him from this focus. The metaphor of living in the desert may apply to our own lives in having lost something or someone held dear: be it work, a loved one, good health, a happy home... sadly we all experience desert times. John's life in the desert is a reminder of God's presence everywhere, in all seasons of life. And it is a reminder that God matters more than what others think of us, because he is not just present for a cup of tea, but is and will remain with us in it all.

God gives us the power to keep our heart and minds set on Christ, even in desert days.

John pointed to Jesus

John's mission was clear. He proclaimed the coming of the kingdom of heaven, called people to repentance before the Lord and baptised them. He remained in the Desert of Judea and people came to him from Jerusalem, all Judea and the whole region of the Jordan. However, he preached of nothing to do with himself. He preached of a Saviour who was coming, saying to those that came to him: "I baptise you with water for repentance. But after me will come one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not fit to carry. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and with fire." (Matthew 3:11) All that John said and did was in order to point to Jesus. He was a man of great humility, deeming himself unworthy of carrying Jesus 'sandals, and yet even Jesus came to John in order to be baptised.

Our mission in this life is to point others to Christ.



John was courageous

John was not afraid of the religious or political leaders of his day. He saw beyond their exterior into the deeper heart, seeing how far away from God they were. He didn't live to people-please but spoke the truth with clarity and passion; simply that all are in need of forgiveness. This truth led to John being imprisoned and ultimately being killed.

There were times in his imprisonment that even John, this great man of God, doubted if God was there. He wondered if Jesus was really the Messiah, the One who had come to set us free. Why was Jesus not setting him free? Yet, even in John's darkest hour, his very imprisonment paved a way for the One who truly sets us free.

Yet, even in John's darkest hour, his very imprisonment paved a way for the One who truly sets us free. And even in the heartless, cruel plot, John's death was not in vain. For to live for Christ, to speak truth, to point others to Him, is never in vain.


John completed his mission, to point others to our Saviour, Jesus Christ.


