#### An Archbishop Steps In......

During the course of this last week it was revealed that ++Justin would be stepping into the Brexit debate. Not simply as a commentator as to how this subject is dividing the nation (alongside all the other associated beliefs and fears of so many different groupings within the population of the United Kingdom), but in an active role. Currently, he is involved in cross-party plans for a Citizens' Assembly to search for an alternative to a 'no deal' Brexit.

I was not surprised to read that this has led to a wealth of criticism, largely from Brexiters. "He shouldn't allow himself to be tempted into what is essentially a very political issue right now" (Iain Duncan Smith). This comment was amongst many others in a similar vain. Another that stood out for me was "he should be in talks about why fewer people are attending [church] rather than..." [Kate Hoey MP].

It's worth reminding ourselves that two years ago ++Justin called for a cross-party commission to find a way forward on this question. And he was right. Since the referendum it has become increasingly clear that 'normal politics' isn't working – it has become the situation that normal politics is disabled by the divisions caused by Brexit. These same divisions spill over into the way we live and behave as a society – it feels as though some of the values of the UK (respect, inclusion, collaboration and integrity) are being eroded.

It seems to me that this is a good example of the very place that the Church should and must be seen to have voice. It may be that our (the church's) avoidance of these situations is one of the factors that cause numbers 'attending' to have dropped as the church seems increasingly distant from the issues that confront society and our world.

#### The Statement from ++Justin

"It is an unexpected privilege to be asked to chair this proposed Citizens' Forum on Brexit. In the past this kind of gathering has, in many places and in difficult situations, opened the way for careful deliberation if at the right time and genuinely representative.

"I am honoured to be approached and would be willing to accept in principle, subject to some conditions which have not yet been met. The main three are first, and indispensably, that the forum should not be a Trojan horse intended to delay or prevent Brexit in any particular form. That power can only be exercised by the government and MPs in parliament. A forum must be open to all possibilities. Second, that it has cross party support (although its members will not be politicians). Third, the process must have time to be properly organised.

"Jesus Christ is the source of reconciliation and healing for individuals and society. It is obviously right that among many others the churches should contribute to the emergence of a dynamic and united country post-Brexit, however it may be achieved. Every one of us must play the part they can in this task.
