### **Transforming Church Together**

An up-date on the Developing Diocesan Strategy

At Diocesan Synod last week, we invested some time in working with the new Diocesan Strategy as it takes shape. A summary of the focus would be that the strategy will be concerned with:

- Serving the local Community
- **Enabling Mission**
- Engaging with more people

These overarching activities will be adapted according to the needs and opportunities of each context. A slide which goes some way to pulling this together is the 'Mutually Reinforcing Strategy' shown below.

At the heart it's about building the Kingdom and the Five Marks of Mission.

- Proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 🗡 Teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- Respond to human need by loving service
- ★ Transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- st Strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

This is very much in keeping with the catholic perspective of the purpose of the church and mission and plays to the strength of churches such as All Saints. You'll see, on the slide, that this is about **people**; the worshipping community, all who live within the parish and local community and all with whom we have some engagement (such as those who use our building). And, following on, it's about the **buildings**, do we enable it's use for the community, keep our doors open, welcome all who pass though the doors, and ensure that this building resource is shaped to meet the needs of those in our context. It is also about **partnerships**, how do we work across the boundaries that so often limit our activities. These are parish and Deanery boundaries, engaging with ideas and projects and worship with other parishes and denominations. And it's about our **communications**, what we say about the life of the church and how we 'live' the church, how we give local and collective voice to matters of social concern – in society and on our doorstep.

As resources reduce, both human and financial, it will be the churches that engage with this process that will benefit from on-going support. It is very much worth our while to reflect upon how we, at All Saints, measure ourselves against this developing strategy. Many churches will be discovering that what worked for them previously will not carry the same weight going forward.

Looking to the future we will be addressing these questions, yet if we take a moment for reflection we already have a number of missional activities and projects that will strengthen our position and provide opportunities for drawing continuing or - perhaps – additional resource.

If I was to suggest a few examples that absolutely link the key features of people, our buildings, working together and our community context they might include:

Friends Together, the dementia accessible café open for all and operated in conjunction with other parishes, social services, willing volunteers. This activity directly relates to each of the four described missional elements of the strategy and is an area where we have the opportunity (with support) to do a good deal more. The Atrium development will significantly strengthen this work by increasing accessibility, providing a welcoming space and not compromising the commercial letting of the Randall Room.

- All Saints Arts. All Saints has over many years won a place as a centre for music and the arts. Helped by being an iconic building with internationally significant windows, All Saints is seen as a venue for musical, visual and spoken arts. Once again this is a missional opportunity that could be creatively developed and relates to each of the missional elements.
- Inclusive Church. This is more than matters associated with gender and sexuality, it's about ethnicity, disability economic power and all that celebrates and affirms each person. Some of this we do quite well and some elements are shaped by our contextual geography. However, looking forward the forecourt development which will give access to all and the Atrium development which will provide accessible toilets are important reflections on our adoption of Kingdom values and support of the missional work.
- Eco Church. All Saints is also registered as an Eco Church. Clearly, we have the Gardens, owned by the Trustees, and use managed by the PCC. This is a hugely important element of our responsibility to care for creation (Fifth Mark). This is being further developed by our reduction of energy loss (40% from church through the Atrium) by way of the Atrium development work, which will also help us generate energy for use in church by way of air source heat pumps and solar array.
- Worship. The nature and quality of worship (music and liturgy and teaching) at All Saints, as experienced at the Parish Mass, is not surpassed by any other Bristol church (except, perhaps, the Cathedral). Additionally, we have the Early Worship Service, a very different experience which has a special place in the hearts of many who attend. It directly links to our 'Inclusive Church' categorization and also very easily welcomes families and young children. Yet it absolutely isn't a service designed solely for children and young families – it is for any and all.

All this is good and positive, yet one factor we will have to address in the not-too-distant future is income. The planned work on the Atrium and the improvement of the Sacristy, along with the increased use of our plant in rental terms, will increase our income. Additionally, our 'Parish Share' (even including the Trust owned Vicarage) only 'holds' our position, rather than enabling us to contribute to support the work of the church in the deprived parts of the Diocese. Yet the positive here is that the on-going development work and the missional opportunities will both serve to provide an increase in revenue, to the benefit of the work of this church and other churches across the Diocese.

### Bishops' letter to The Times on the Rwanda asylum policy

### 14/06/2022

All of the current Lords Spiritual have signed a letter to The Times voicing alarm about the Government's plan to send asylum seekers to Rwanda as early as today. They wrote:

### Sir,

Whether or not the first deportation flight leaves Britain today for Rwanda, this policy should shame us as a nation. Rwanda is a brave country recovering from catastrophic genocide. The shame is our own, because our Christian heritage should inspire us to treat asylum seekers with compassion, fairness and justice, as we have for centuries. Those to be deported to Rwanda have had no chance to appeal, or reunite with family in Britain. They have had no consideration of their asylum claim, recognition of their medical or other needs, or any attempt to understand their predicament.

Many are desperate people fleeing unspeakable horrors. Many are Iranians, Eritreans and Sudanese citizens, who have an asylum grant rate of at least 88 per cent. These are people Jesus had in mind as he said when we offer hospitality to a stranger, we do it for him. They are the vulnerable that the Old Testament calls us to value. We cannot offer asylum to everyone, but we must not outsource our ethical responsibilities, or discard international law — which protects the right to claim asylum.

We must end the evil trafficking; many churches are involved in fighting this evil. This needs global co-operation across every level of society. To reduce dangerous journeys to the UK we need safe routes: the church will continue to advocate for them. But deportations — and the potential forced return of asylum seekers to their home countries — are not the way. This immoral policy shames Britain.


