Three Focused CDCA Activities

The Wildlife Walks

We in Clifton Down may live in a densely populated urban area, but not so far away are a wide variety of open spaces, landscapes and wildlife. Many people live in flats or bedsits with limited access to open space. The pandemic especially underlined how important it is to get outdoors not just for health and interest but for general well-being.



So over the last couple of years CDCA has organized a series of wildlife walks with local expert Steve England who has a unique talent and enthusiasm in bringing landscapes to life. Steve has had us lighting fires with a flint, foraging for wild sea beats, spotting a wide range of bird life, explained the evolution of landscapes and even showed us a photo of a gigantic cod fish caught in the Bristol Channel (but sadly not on our walk!)

In part funded by the Community Rail Partnership we have travelled by train to Severn Beach which is a leading international location for migrating birds, to Backwell Lake where we enjoyed a pleasant and interesting walk around the water before a pub lunch, to Lamplighters Nature Reserve where the flat and metaled path allows even those with mobility problems to take part as well as walking up the Trym Vallery from Sea Mills railway station.

The number of people joining us varies between 8 and more than 30. Has included older people, families with children, students and people from a wide range of backgrounds reflecting our diverse community. So the walks have an added benefit of helping to bring the community together.

Our walks are open to anyone who lives in the Clifton Down area and even beyond if numbers permit, so do join us!

The Litter Picks

Whilst the fox population does enjoy the fast-food containers that sometimes litter our streets (along with a lot of other packaging and rubbish) most of us do not. It looks unpleasant, can be a health hazard and a danger for those with walking problems.



We can always use an extra hand so do join us !

The City Council / Bristol Waste Street cleaners do their best but have limited and declining resources, so CDCA runs a litter pick on the first Sunday of every month to help out. Equipped with grabbers, bags and other needed tools we take to the streets and clean up the area. Takeaway cartons, drink bottles and cans, plastic food containers are just some of the more commonly found items that need to be removed. The bags of collected litter are then taken away by Bristol Waste for disposal or recycling. Leaving Clifton Down looking just a little better!

The Mini-Allotment Project



Following the successful adoption of Clifton Down Station which, apart from the Wildlife Walks, also has our Gardening Crew looking after the planters on the station platforms, we have embarked on an ambitious project to turn the unused car park behind Clifton Down Shopping Centre into a thriving Mini-Allotment site.


The Mini-Allotment will give between 11-44 people the opportunity to grow some of their own food close to their homes as well as giving everyone entering the Shopping Centre from Alma Vale Road a well-being boost seeing the site instead of an expanse of tarmac.

We are looking for sponsors – both corporate and individuals, and we will be launching a crowd funding site soon.

Each planter will measure 5.5m x 1m x 60cm. Plot holders will be able to apply for up to 4 planters. Water will be available on site via a dipping tank.

Flower Gifts at Easter

Easter is the holiest day of the Christian calendar, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. At Easter flowers are frequently used in abundance to express the joy and triumph of the holiday. And are all the more striking following the season of Lent when flowers have not been used inside church.

Several flowers are traditionally associated with Easter, having acquired symbolic meaning over the years. *Easter lilies*: Easter lilies, with their large white trumpet-shaped blooms and lovely fragrance, are the most well-known flower used at Easter. There are many meanings associated with this flower: for example, the white hue represents Jesus's purity, and the shape of the trumpet recalls the trumpet of the angel Gabriel. Also, the flower grows from a bulb buried in the ground, which is considered symbolic of Christ's resurrection.


