This week the Church marks two important Feast Days - the Birthday of the Blessed Virgin Mary on 8th September and Holy Cross Day on the 14th.



For Anglo-catholic churches such as All Saints, Mary is an important focus for worship. At her statue there is a votive light, and candles to offer up our prayers. The Angelus bell is rung at 9 am and 6 pm, to commemorate the Incarnation. It is traditionally a call to prayer and to spread goodwill to everyone. The Angelus prayer (and during Eastertide the Regina Coeli) is recited daily at morning and evening prayer. At choral evensongs choirs sing the Magnificat, surely one of our most joyful prayers.



This date, a week after the beginning of the Eastern Church's year and the first step in God's plan for the coming of Christ into the world, is one of only three birthdays we mark.



Holy Cross day commemorates the story of the finding of the True Cross by St. Helena, the mother of the Roman emperor Constantine. She was on pilgrimage to Jerusalem in around 326 AD. Emperor Hadrian had built two temples on the site of Our Lord's crucifixion and burial, but Helena had these removed and the site excavated. Nails, a spear and three crosses were found, but which was the True Cross? With the help of Macarius, bishop of Jerusalem, each was taken and placed on a woman as she lay dying. The first two had no effect, but after the third she got up, all her strength restored. Helena built the Church of the Holy Sepulchre over the spot where the cross had been discovered. In it she placed part of the cross, with the other part taken back to Rome and installed in the Basilica church of Santa Croce.

Saying morning and evening prayer in All Saints is a tradition going back to its foundation in 1868. In recent years this tradition had been continued by a small group of parishioners. It is a contemplative act of worship which might be solitary or with a few other people.


Extra details: There will be a festival bookshop at the event where people can pick up copies of Diarmaid's book and have it signed by the author.


