Saints Michael and All Angels: Feast day 29th September

In Christian theology, angels are pure spiritual, non-corporeal, intellectual beings who act as intermediaries between God and humanity. The word angel is derived from the Greek for 'messenger'. And so the angels are God's messengers to us and also guide, help and protect us in this life and also in the life to come. The word saint is derived from the Latin word for holy, and applies to angels as they are set apart for the tasks God assigns them. Angels have no material being and no gender. But that has not stopped them being depicted in art and iconography. Daniel 8:15 describes Gabriel as appearing in the "likeness of man" and in Daniel 9:21 he is referred to as "the man Gabriel." Raphael too, in the Book of Tobit appears as a young man, companion to Tobias. Perhaps because of these verses angels have been usually depicted in the form of young men, but with wings to indicate their non-human status.

While three archangels are explicitly named in scripture, (Saint Michael the patron saint of soldiers, Saint Gabriel the patron of messengers, Saint Raphael the patron of travellers, the blind and physicians), the Church has recognised that there are seven archangels, eg Tobit 12:15 "I am Raphael, one of the seven angels who stand in the glorious presence of the Lord, ready to serve him." The names given to the others not named in the Bible have varied.

From a Sermon of Pope Saint Gregory the Great


You should be aware that the word "angel" denotes a function rather than a nature. Those holy spirits of heaven have indeed always been spirits. They can only be called angels when they deliver some message. Moreover, those who deliver messages of lesser importance are called angels; and those who proclaim messages of supreme importance are called archangels. And so it was that not merely an angel but the archangel Gabriel was sent to the Virgin Mary. It was only fitting that the highest angel should come to announce the greatest of all messages.

Some angels are given proper names to denote the service they are empowered to perform. In that holy city where perfect knowledge flows from the vision of almighty God, those who have no names may easily be known. But personal names are assigned to some, not because they could not be known without them, but rather to denote their ministry when they came among us. Thus Michael means "Who is like God"; Gabriel is "The Strength of God"; and Raphael is "God's Remedy."

Whenever some act of wondrous power must be performed, Michael is sent, so that his action and his name may make it clear that no one can do what God does by his superior power. So also our ancient foe desired in his pride to be like God, saying: *I will exalt my throne above the states of heaven; I will be like the Most High.* He will be allowed to remain in power until the end of the world when he will be destroyed in the final punishment. Then, he will fight with the archangel Michael, as we are told by John: *A battle was fought with Michael the archangel*.

So too Gabriel, who is called God's strength, was sent to Mary. He came to announce the One who appeared as a humble man to quell the cosmic powers. Thus God's strength announced the coming of the Lord of the heavenly powers, mighty in battle.


Raphael means, as I have said, God's remedy, for when he touched Tobit's eyes in order to cure him, he banished the darkness of his blindness. Thus, since he is to heal, he is rightly called God's remedy.

Apart from the seven archangels, there are countless other ranks of angels, including the guardian angels, individual to each of us, and the whole life of the Church benefits from the help and worship of angels. At mass we join in the eternal praise offered to God by the angels when we say or sing the Sanctus: "Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might." From the moment of our conception we are surrounded by their watchful care. It was J. R. R. Tolkien who described the Guardian Angel as "God's very attention itself, personalised."





Pilgrimage Walk, Saturday 12th October

Our parish walks to date have lasted fewer than two hours and there has been some interest expressed in having a day-long walk, perhaps as a pilgrimage. Pilgrimage has three parts:

- the journey away from home and the leaving behind of the usual
- the destination which is usually a holy place
- the going home to live life more fully after the experience.

The October walk will thus be a pilgrimage taking a circular walk from Severn Beach to Aust. Why Aust? St Augustine of Canterbury is said to have met the British (including Welsh) bishops on the bank of the Severn at St Augustine's Oak in the early C7. In the absence of surviving cartography, we don't not know quite where this was, but it is believed to have been at Aust which is thus our holy place. The walks will follow the new reinforced sea wall beside the Severn, a metalled path for most of the way, to Aust where we will try to get in to the church of St John. We will then call at the Boar's Head for the intake and release of fluids before walking back to Aust through the meadows and over the rhynes.

Details

- 10 am train from Clifton Down to Severn Beach, ASLEF permitting
- Bring packed lunch as the Boar's Head is very popular and getting a group fed will take a considerable time
- Wear boots as it may be muddy and slippy particularly on the way back
- Trousers as some bits of the path are slightly brambly
- Distance about 12 km recce took c. 2 hrs each way at a reasonable pace
- Bring binoculars if a birder; the migrants will be arriving
- Probably the 4.01pm train home
- A map and sign-up sheet will appear in the porch






