Harvest Festivals in Scripture

Feasts connected to harvest are mentioned in the Bible. The Feast of Weeks (Shavout) marked the first fruits of harvest, and the Feast of Ingathering (Sukkot) marked the end of harvest. In the Hebrew calendar, the Feast of Ingathering finished on the twenty-first day of the seventh month, Tishrei, which falls between late September and late October.

Exodus (23:16) 'You shall keep the feast of ingathering at the end of the year, when you gather in from the field the fruit of your labour'. And again, in Exodus (34:22) where it is called the 'Festival of Ingathering at the year's end' in the traditional King James Version or the 'Festival of the Final Harvest' in newer translations. It marked the end of the harvest and thus of the agricultural year.

Thanksgiving Days

The Book of Common Prayer, used by the Church of England, provides for special Thanksgiving Prayers for specific occasions such as times of rain after drought, peace, deliverance from plague, and for plenty.

Sometimes national Thanksgiving Days were called for special occasions. Thanksgiving Days were called in 1588 after the defeat of the Spanish Armada, after the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805, in 1815 after the Battle of Waterloo, and on April 14 1833 to mark the end of a cholera epidemic.

Harvest Thanksgivings



In years when there was an abundant harvest nationally, there would be a nationally set Thanksgiving Day for the Church of England to thank God for the harvest. These thanksgivings were called Harvest Thanksgivings.

In the Church of England there were National Harvest Thanksgiving Days in 1796, 1801, 1810, 1813, 1832 and 1842. These were seen more in the West Country (Devon and Cornwall for instance) where the climate tends to be milder and harvest season typically begins earlier.

The mid-1840s are often referred to as the Hungry Forties due to a series of poor harvests. The most devastating event during this period was the Irish Potato Famine. In 1847, when a bountiful harvest finally occurred, a national Harvest Thanksgiving Day was established for Sunday, October 17, 1847, during which churches collected donations for the relief of the impoverished in Ireland.

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


Subsequent years saw further poor harvests. Everyone will have been grateful, therefore, for the bountiful harvest in 1854.

A national Harvest Thanksgiving Day was established on Sunday, October 1, 1854. Following this, more bountiful harvests were recorded in the years from 1855 to 1859. Despite experiencing a poor harvest in 1860, the concept of an annual Harvest Thanksgiving service had already gained popularity within the church calendar. By the 1860s, such services became a regular occurrence in Anglican churches, and by the 1870s, they began to be adopted by non-conformist churches as well. St Paul's Cathedral in London hosted its inaugural service in 1874.

There was nothing to stop a bishop or priest calling a local Harvest Thanksgiving. These were more common in the West Country especially in Devon and Cornwall where the English climate is generally milder, and harvest is usually earlier. Good harvests in Devon in the 1830s were marked by many Harvest Thanksgivings. Buckerell in Devon has held a Harvest Thanksgiving annually since 1840. In 1843 some local Harvest Thanksgivings were called in Cornwall. Revd J Ellis of St Minver held a harvest festival in September 1843.

Meanwhile Fr Robert Hawker of Morwenstow invited all his parishioners to a special service on the first Sunday in October 1843, to share communion with bread made from the newly harvested corn. This caught on and today many churches have a freshly made loaf on their communion table at harvest time.

Pilgrimage Walk, Saturday 12th October

Our parish walks to date have lasted fewer than two hours and there has been some interest expressed in having a day-long walk, perhaps as a pilgrimage. Pilgrimage has three parts:

- the journey away from home and the leaving behind of the usual
- the destination which is usually a holy place
- the going home to live life more fully after the experience.

The October walk will thus be a pilgrimage taking a circular walk from Severn Beach to Aust. Why Aust? St Augustine of Canterbury is said to have met the British (including Welsh) bishops on the bank of the Severn at St Augustine's Oak in the early C7. In the absence of surviving cartography, we don't not know quite where this was, but it is believed to have been at Aust which is thus our holy place. The walks will follow the new reinforced sea wall beside the Severn, a metalled path for most of the way, to Aust where we will try to get in to the church of St John. We will then call at the Boar's Head for the intake and release of fluids before walking back to Aust through the meadows and over the rhynes.

Details

- 10 am train from Clifton Down to Severn Beach, ASLEF permitting
- Bring packed lunch as the Boar's Head is very popular and getting a group fed will take a considerable time
- Wear boots as it may be muddy and slippy particularly on the way back
- Trousers as some bits of the path are slightly brambly
- Distance about 12 km recce took c. 2 hrs each way at a reasonable pace
- Bring binoculars if a birder; the migrants will be arriving
- Probably the 4.01pm train home
- A map and sign-up sheet will appear in the porch

Sunday 6th of October is Homelessness Sunday






