## Advent Sunday – Year C The Strength to Endure the Trouble of This World

This is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of the new liturgical year. The Advent season includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.



In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke is the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C). Today's Gospel is taken from the last chapter before the passion narrative in which Jesus is teaching in the Temple. We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. .

This passage marks the conclusion of a lengthy dialogue in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, warns about the persecution and tribulations to follow, and identifies the signs that will signal the coming of the Son of Man in glory.

The community for whom Luke wrote his Gospel may have believed that they were already experiencing some of the events Jesus described. Most scholars believe that Luke's Gospel was written after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 A.D. At the time, many Christians interpreted this event as an indication that Jesus' second coming was near.

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Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear, Jesus indicates that others will be frightened; Jesus' disciples are not to fear, but are to stand tall. Yet Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or tribulations. He encourages his disciples to pray for strength. The early Christian communities did not find consolation in the promise of a utopia, nor should we. Instead, we find in our Christian faith the means by which we witness to God's unfailing love for us in all circumstances

Jesus' predictions about the end times may sound dire, but in the next paragraph Luke tells us that people woke early to listen to Jesus' teaching in the Temple area. In his person and in his message, those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation. Like the first Christians, we may encounter events and circumstances that could lead us to despair. Through prayer, however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus' words and in his continuing presence with us to endure all things and to witness to the action of God in our world.

#### **Lenten and Advent Flowers**

In general, churches use flowers to indicate the importance of occasions and to signify the season. In Judeo-Christian traditions, flowers symbolise the glory of the Garden of Eden and are considered to be among God's most beautiful creations. As is so often remarked, we are very fortunate to have such quality arrangements at All Saints.

During Lent and Advent the general catholic instruction is:

"Moderation should be observed when decorating the Sanctuary and church interior.

During Advent the floral decoration of the Sanctuary should be marked by a moderation that reflects the character of this season, but nevertheless, does not anticipate the full joy of the Nativity of the Lord.


During Lent the Sanctuary is not to be decorated with flowers.

Laetare Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent), occasional offices, solemnities and feasts are exceptions to this rule."

This means no flowers in church during Lent – apart from the exceptions described above. Advent is slightly different in that any church decorations have a more penitential feeling, hence the greenery surrounding the Advent Wreath. As with Lent, Gaudete Sunday (third of Advent) and other exceptions are accepted.

At All Saints, within the Entrance to the Atrium, under the Tower, during Lent, there will often be a Lenten Display using products from the natural world and following a Lenten Theme. We usually provide words of explanation and description for the benefit of visitors so as to support the understanding of the theme.

The Ukraine and Gaza tables may have an appropriate noble simplicity of decoration.



### Advent Pilgrimage Sunday 8th December at 6.00pm



Walks for All - and their dogs. Saturday 14th December




The walk on 14<sup>th</sup> December will be a circuit through Leigh Woods.

The Julian Trust Carol Service at the Night Shelter Little Bishop Street St Pauls




Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> December at 7pm

Mince pies and coffee will be available after the service.





Mon 2	Mass 10.00am  During Advent we think of the Light that shines in the darkness. Today pray for all who have their vision compromised. Good vision is something that we all recognize the importance of. However, it is something that a lot of us take for granted. For a lot of people, being blind is something that they have lived with their entire lives. For others, it is something that has crept upon them at a later age. There are then those that have good vision, but they live in fear of this taken away from them. In fact, blindness ranks as one of the top fears for aging people around the world today.
Tue 3	We pray for all who 'submit to the will of God'. This is the translation of the word 'Islam' – we pray for, Muslims, the billion followers around the world of whom 1.5M live in the UK. Pray for all those who encounter and assist us to encounter with contemporary Islam.
