15th December 2024 3rd Sunday of Advent Gaudete Sunday

Advent – in Two Chapters

The first chapter looks to the future. The second looks to the past. They both help us to live in faith in the present.

Chapter One is from the beginning of Advent until December 16. The liturgy, scripture readings and focus of this part of Advent demand that we open our eyes — wake up — and expect the coming of the Messiah. This does not refer to the birth of Jesus 2000 years ago. The beginning of Advent asks us to look to the future for the Second Coming of Christ. This part of Advent has little to do with remembering the Christ child born in Bethlehem. That will come later. This first part is more serious in tone. We listen in anticipation, expectation, hope and promise that Christ will come in the future to fulfil and complete the reign of God.

Advent is not a time when we pretend to be the people awaiting the Messiah's arrival. During Advent we recall the stories of our ancestors in faith who lived with such expectations and eventually saw them fulfilled when Jesus was born. We are not waiting for the birth of a saviour. He is already born into our world at that first Christmas. During Advent the stories of our ancestors become our own story. We remember these great stories because they give us hope today as we now prepare for the Second Coming of Christ.

Listen to the last lines of the book of Revelation: "The Spirit and bride say 'Come.' Let the hearer say 'Come.'... Amen! Come, Lord Jesus! The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all." (Rev. 22:17, 20-21). The Bible ends with this great invitation to the Lord to come again and make our world right. The first part of Advent turns our eyes towards this future coming of Christ. We must make ready to receive the Lord when he comes again.



Chapter Two of Advent is from December 17-24. These last eight days before Christmas recall the first coming of God in flesh through the birth of Christ. This preparation teaches us an important lesson about Christmas. God was born into our world and took on our flesh. This incarnation continues to unfold in our current time and place. Christmas does not simply remember a past event as if it were over and done with. Christmas encourages us to live in hope and faith that God will continue to enter our world and bring about God's reign.

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Both liturgy and scripture combine, during Advent to 'help us to understand fully the value and meaning of the mystery of Christmas. It is not just about commemorating the historical event, which occurred some 2,000 years ago in a little village of Judea. Instead, it is necessary to understand that the whole of our life must be an 'advent,' a vigilant awaiting of the final coming of Christ. To predispose our mind to welcome the Lord who, as we say in the Creed, one day will come to judge the living and the dead, we must learn to recognize him as present in the events of daily life.'

Consequently, Advent can be seen as an intense training that directs us decisively toward 'him who already came, who will come, and who comes continuously.'

Gaudete Sunday

This Sunday is the vibrant celebration of Gaudete Sunday, a special day in the Advent Season that fills our hearts with joy and anticipation. As we journey towards Christmas, this Sunday stands out as a beacon of joy and hope.

What is Gaudete Sunday?

'A Reminder' of what we already know: Gaudete Sunday is the third Sunday of Advent in the liturgical calendar of most denominations within Western Christianity. The day takes its common name from the Latin word Gaudete ("Rejoice"), the first word of the introit:

Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete. Modestia vestra nota sit omnibus hominibus: Dominus enim prope est. Nihil solliciti sitis: sed in omni oratione et obsecratione cum gratiarum actione petitiones vestræ innotescant apud Deum. Benedixisti Domine terram tuam: avertisti captivitatem Jacob.

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Let your forbearance be known to all, for the Lord is near at hand; have no anxiety about anything, but in all things, by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be known to God. Lord, you have blessed your land; you have turned away the captivity of Jacob."

Philippians 4:4-6

History of Gaudete Sunday

The history of Gaudete Sunday is deeply rooted in Christian tradition. The observance dates back to the medieval period when the church recognized the need to balance the penitential nature of Advent with moments of joy and hope. The third Sunday of Advent serves as a brief respite from the more sombre aspects of the season, allowing believers to rejoice in the imminent arrival of the Christ child.

The liturgical colour for Gaudete Sunday is rose or pink, symbolizing joy and a departure from the traditional purple associated with penance and preparation. This distinctive colour choice is a visual cue to the faithful that a shift toward celebration and gladness is underway.



Gaudete Sunday is also marked by the lighting of the third candle on the Advent wreath, often known as the "Gaudete Candle" or the "Candle of Joy." This candle represents the joy that Christians experience as they draw closer to the celebration of the birth of Jesus.

In essence, Gaudete Sunday encapsulates the dual nature of Advent – a time for reflection and repentance, balanced with anticipation and rejoicing in the promise of redemption. It serves as a reminder that, even in the midst of our preparations, there is joy to be found in the expectation of the Savior's arrival.

Three Features of Gaudete Sunday

Joyful Anticipation: Gaudete Sunday serves as a moment of joyful anticipation in the Advent season. As the name suggests ("Gaudete," meaning "rejoice" in Latin), this Sunday encourages believers to take a break from the penitential aspects of Advent and rejoice in the imminent arrival of Jesus Christ.

Joyful Decorations: Churches may be decorated with an emphasis on joy. This typically includes floral arrangements (within the Sanctuary), banners, or other decorations that reflect the festive spirit of Gaudete Sunday.

Acts of Kindness: In the spirit of joy and giving some Christian communities use Gaudete Sunday as an opportunity to engage in acts of kindness and charity. This typically involves outreach to those in need or special community service projects.

- growing a healthy ecology of church; further extending the care of souls into all the parish






Walks for All - and their dogs. Saturday 14th December


