Bishop of Bristol announces retirement

Retirement of The Rt Revd Vivienne Faull, Bishop of Bristol The Rt Revd Vivienne Faull, by kind permission of the King, will retire as Bishop of Bristol on 1 September 2025. The Archbishop of York granted Bishop Viv permission to remain in office after her 70th birthday in May, to ordain new Deacons and Priests in the summer.



Bishop Viv was enthroned as the 56th Bishop of Bristol at Bristol Cathedral on 20 October 2018, having previously served as the Dean of York. As Bishop of Bristol, she has provided episcopal guidance to parishes across Bristol, Swindon, South Gloucestershire, and North Wiltshire. In addition, she has been a member of the House of Lords and, since 2021, one of the lead bishops for church and cathedral buildings and a Church Commissioner.

Bishop Viv said: "After 42 years in full-time ministry as Deaconess, Deacon, Priest and Bishop, the time has come for a rest. I have revelled in each of the places and communities to which God has called me and have been enriched by them all.

"My seven years in Bristol, where my mother — a great campaigner for the ordination of women — was born, baptised and confirmed, has been a beautiful coda, and I will leave this generous, creative, brave and open diocese with deep gratitude for all that, in the power of the Holy Spirit, we have learnt and transformed together.

"May Christ bless and keep us now and in our pilgrimages ahead."

There will be an opportunity to say farewell to Bishop Viv at a special service held at Bristol Cathedral at 3.00pm on Saturday, 30 August 2025, to which all are welcome.

Following Bishop Viv's announcement, the process of identifying the next Bishop of Bristol will begin, in consultation with parishes and other groups from across the diocese.

Healing Ministry at All Saints: An Opportunity ...

Christian healing ministry is as old as the Church itself, practised down the centuries in many different contexts and situations from the New Testament onwards, always with Christ at the centre, always in his name, and always concerned with *wholeness*, not solely with the restoration of healthy bodies. The spiritual, mental and physical aspects of healing for Christians are inextricably linked and complementary. In our Catholic tradition especially, we see it as sacramental in its widest sense – an outward and visible sign bringing an inward blessing - its purpose being initiating and maintaining our souls in wholeness. In bestowing this ministry, the Church is bearing witness to what Christ himself instituted in his earthly ministry and commissioned his disciples (which includes ourselves) to continue after his death, resurrection and ascension. Our regular prayers for the sick and those in need is one of the ways we do this.

Here at All Saints we are going to extend this ministry we already practise to include a further opportunity, that of receiving Laying-on-of-hands and Anointing at the Sunday Parish Mass. It will take place monthly, to begin with, during the distribution of Holy Communion. During this time there will be members of the Ministry Team available in the space beneath the balcony by the banner case for any wishing to come. Many people will have received this before and know of its benefits; for others it will be a new experience. It's worth adding here that it is in no way intended to be an alternative to medical treatment. It may be requested for oneself or for someone else. Any who wish may quietly tell the team members a little about the condition or person needing prayer, but equally some may simply present themselves without words.



Laying-on-of-hands is done on the head or shoulders; anointing is done on the palms of each hand and on the forehead. The ministers will pray silently awhile during this time, and may finish with a spoken prayer, such as these

(Laying-on-of-hands) In the name of God and trusting in his might alone, receive Christ's healing touch to make you whole. May Christ bring you wholeness of body, mind and spirit, deliver you from every evil, and give you his peace.

(Anointing) I anoint you in the name of God who gives you life. Receive Christ's forgiveness, his healing and his love. May the Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ grant you the riches of his grace, his wholeness and his peace.

Although this will be done during worship in view of the congregation, it is also private between the ministers and the person coming forward. However, the prayers of everyone gathered are of immense importance and comfort to all concerned, so each person's involvement in that way is sought. Be assured the ministers are committed to prayer and preparation for their ministry, that they may be worthy channels, that God will draw those he wishes to come. They are also pledged to absolute confidentiality.

One or two further things to consider. Prayerful preparation is desirable before receiving, though lack of it should never be a stumbling block where a need is felt. The openness to the gift of healing needs to continue afterwards in private prayer. We should keep in mind always that God heals as he wills, which may be at variance with our own desires, though not necessarily. We shall likely come to realise that God's answer far exceeds our greatest longing.

The first opportunity for this healing ministry will happen on 23rd February, with further dates planned for 23rd March and 26th April. Meantime, please pray for the blessing and development of this important work, for all who seek Christ's healing through it and all who offer themselves to give it in his name. If you have questions or concerns, please talk to a member of the Ministry Team.

A prayer for those offering healing:

Heavenly Father and everlasting God, anointed by your Spirit, your Son Our Lord Jesus Christ preached the gospel and healed the sick. Fill these your servants who believe in your word with the Holy Spirit. Empower them for your service. Pour upon them your Spirit of love and joy and peace. Anoint them with the Spirit of Jesus, in whom alone we find both healing and salvation, and in whose name we ask. Amen

The walk will end up at Temple Meads Station and suggested return is by train/bus to Clifton Down or bus (8) back to the Church.




