A PROUD DEMENTIA

In the early 1990's four Sisters of the Church (CSC) moved to Ashley Road and the Community has had a presence here ever since. The original purpose, nearly thirty-five years ago, was to provide a 'Praying Presence' in a racially troubled part of Bristol.

It should be remembered that the St Paul's riots of 1980 became a pivotal moment for black communities within the UK. This period is one in a pattern of Bristol unrest; Old Mark riot 1932, Park Street riot 1944, St Paul's riot 1980, St Paul's riot 1986, Hartcliffe riot 1992, Stokes Croft (Tesco) riot 2011, and Bridewell riot 2021.

Clearly, the Sisters' provided a much needed 'Praying Presence' at the geographic heart of unrest. This is very much part of the CSC ministry within the world aligned with 'Justice and Peace'.

This Ministry of Prayer rapidly developed into active service. The nature of the surrounding community was largely deprived, with considerable need, with racial unrest, addiction, prostitution and frequent mental and physical health problems. Prayer quickly led to what used to be described as 'door-step ministry' where individuals in all forms of need came to the 'Community door' to ask for practical help as well as prayer.

This ministry has become the 'The Five Loaves and Two Fishes Project'. On each and every active day, whilst the Project is in operation, some 100 to 150 people attend the Project. Anyone and everybody is welcome, no one is judged, no justification or voucher is required.

Clients receive food parcels and are given hot drinks and sandwiches; additionally, form filling and key phone calls (to, for example, Bristol City Council) are made on behalf of clients, a 'duty solicitor' is often available, and for those in real need fuel keys are refreshed. For families, who have nothing, there is an opportunity for short-break family holidays and also the occasional 'Children's Day Out'. Holidays, days out, trips and recovery of wayward clients was one of the key roles for Sister Rosie.

Sister Rosie, we wish you every blessing in your continuing ministry in Clevedon.




