Going on Retreat

Many people, of all faiths, ensure that a 'Retreat' becomes part of their Discipline of Life.

There are many different settings, structures, and shapes of retreat that can be taken. And it's important to remember that God is available to us everywhere. For each of us the question is where and how we can best tune our perception to become aware of God's presence. The answer will not be the same for each one of us, nor for just one of ourselves in every season.

Fortunately, there is a vast range of retreat experiences from which we can select. Here at ASC some elect to go on the Parish Retreat, taking place this weekend at Llangasty Retreat House.

The parish retreat is a 'led' retreat which, primarily, is focused on our own community and our collective journey of faith. This year it will be led by Mthr Nicola.

In addition to the Parish Retreat, or as an alternative, many at ASC elect to go on a 'Private Retreat'. Here the focus is on oneself, and people spend a few days (or sometimes a week) living apart and following their own objectives or purpose. Sometimes the 'purpose' is shaped by a spiritual book, a section of scripture, or designed with a spiritual director. Sometimes the 'purpose' is provided by attending a retreat that is being led but is designed for people from a wide variety of parishes and

places; or is themed, such as Icon Writing or a painting retreat.

Where to go is also a question. Perhaps a monastic setting such as with the Franciscans at Glasshampton Friary, or the Benedictines at Mucknell Abbey, or the Sisters of the Church at Gerrards Cross.

At these locations a retreatant is invited to share in the rhythm of the monastic day, which is structured around the daily "Office" (corporate, liturgical prayers), the celebration of the Eucharist, and communal meals. Outside of these times they hope to offer the space, solitude and quiet that so many guests find a source of renewal and healing. Others elect to go to a Retreat Centre such as Ammerdown or Sheldon (or indeed Elsie Briggs House) where space is provided to follow your own desired path.

Insight from the Cowley Fathers (SSJE)

Not surprisingly, retreats are an expected part of the rhythm of life for clergy, LLMs and the Religious. The Society of Saint John the Evangelist (SSJE) an Anglican Religious Order, founded in the parish of Cowley in Oxford and now located in Cambridge, Massachusetts, have this expectation as an item in their Rule of Life:

"Times of retreat are essential elements in the rhythm of our life. They enable us to celebrate the primacy of the love of God above all else. Whenever we enter retreat we seek to be more available to God so that we may enter more fully into the divine life"

(SSJE Rule of Life, Ch. 29)

Talks about the opportunity to recall God's love – A Retreat or an Advance

'There are many ways of entering into retreat. At times we will want to use our time of retreat to listen and discern God's purposes in our life, especially if we are in a place of confusion, conflict, or uncertainty. At other times we may be facing an important choice and will find a period of silent retreat to be a helpful clearing space in which to weigh our options in prayer. At times, we will want to explore more deeply the nature of God, the person of Christ, or some aspect of our human condition. These are ways of using retreat to "advance" the spiritual life.

As our Brother Curtis Almquist likes to remind us, most often "a retreat is not an advance." Retreats invite us to return to the God we already know, to recall and to re-experience God's love for us, to receive from God the gifts we need this day. '







If you are free at any time between 10.30 and 5pm and are willing to Host a session for this event please sign up on the list in the porch. Thank you.





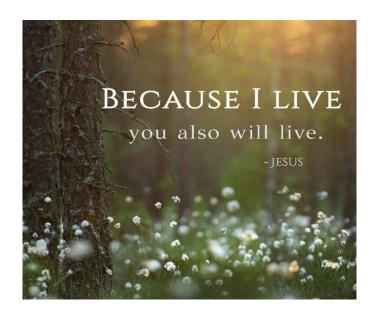
