The Quiet Revival

Did you see the Lioness, Michelle Agyemang, giving glory to God during an interview after their Euro victory last week end? Her faith in God was clear and she belongs to the generation which is contributing to what's being called 'a quiet revival' in church going. These young people – and the trend is apparently most notable amongst young men – are, apparently, seeking meaning amidst the background noise and uncertainty of their lives.

It's hoped that this increase in church going and the exploration of faith will lead to a corresponding increase in vocations. Of course every Christian has a vocation, but it's vocations to the ordained life that are in short supply in the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches. The path to explore a calling to ordination differs from individual to individual and from Diocese to Diocese, but I thought it might be helpful for anyone reading this who is considering ordination, or who is interested in how the selection process works, to have a rough idea of what might lie ahead:

Am I called to be ordained?

This particular calling is experienced differently by everyone who senses that God might be inviting them to respond to the invitation to serve as an ordained person. It's important to remember that it is an invitation and there is no requirement to say yes. Being reconciled to God's call within oneself and then articulating it to others requires courage, because whether or not it comes to anything, it's almost certainly life-changing.

What next?

A calling to ordination should first of all be discussed with the parish priest where the person worships. Together they will start to ascertain whether the calling is realistic, obedient and informed and will do some preparatory work with the potential candidate. For example: do they have a Spiritual Director/mentor, do they regularly say the Daily Office/attend Mass, how involved are they in the life of the church, what is their family's reaction and are they aware of the stresses and strains that may lie ahead?

Once the parish priest is content that the person is ready to proceed, they will write to the Diocesan Director of Ordinands, (DDO) introducing them to the potential candidate.

The Diocesan Process

The DDO and the candidate will meet several times as the discernment process gets underway. The candidate may be asked to undertake short placements in churches of different traditions, in order to fully understand the breadth of the Anglican Church. There may be the requirement for greater involvement in the local worshipping community, to gain experience, for example, of working with volunteers or children. The candidate may be asked to preach and lead intercessions, and possibly write a few paragraphs about their understanding of various aspects of the Christian faith and church life. Every DDO works in a different way with their candidates and the length of time this part of the discernment process takes varies considerably, from a few months to a few years.

The period of local discernment usually ends with a Diocesan Discernment Day, when candidates participate in a practice Selection Panel. Depending on how they cope with this, they will then proceed to the national team of Selectors.

National Selection Process

The National Selection happens in two stages, beginning with a set of brief chats with Bishops' Advisors on zoom, known as a Carousel. Each chat is given a score and if it's felt the candidate is ready to move on to the second stage, they are asked to attend a residential Panel. These take place in many locations around the country and the candidates stay for one night and two days. There are up to six candidates on each Panel and whilst there they will take part in a group exercise, have interviews and informal chats, participate in worship and write a reflection.

Following the Panel the candidate is either recommended for training – sometimes with conditions for further work prior to training – or not recommended. The whole process is undertaken with great care and professionalism and in my opinion it's something the Church of England does really well. Once recommended for training the candidate becomes an ordinand and must inform the Bishop of any important changes in their personal circumstances, such as engagement, marriage etc.

Training takes place in a theological college and may be residential for younger candidates, or non-residential, full-time or part-time. It lasts for two or three years. During training, the college, the DDO and the Sponsoring Bishop take the decision as to whether or not to recommend the ordinand for ordination. At that point they will either be offered a curacy (title post) in their sending Diocese, or if none are available they will be released to find a post elsewhere in the country.

Everyone is ordained a deacon first, then usually after a year, they are ordained priest. Curacy in a title post usually lasts for three years. After that, when the curate is 'signed off' they are free to apply for posts anywhere in the Anglican Communion.

Serving as a priest is a huge privilege – the best job in the world!

Let's pray that the 'quiet revival' in church going will lead to more vocations to the ordained life. If you sense that God might be calling you or someone you know to ordination, please do confide in Fr Charles or a member of the clergy team for help and advice.

To assist with planning, we ask that all guests book in no later than 20 August 2025 via:




