Trusting God – with the help of Bartholomew

For a quick view of Bartholomew's style read John 1:43-51!

The apostle Philip was a friend of Nathanael (Bartholomew), an Israelite. We read that Philip tells Bartholomew that he, Andrew, and Peter have found the Son of God! Bartholomew responds,

"Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?"

"Come and see" says Philip.

When Jesus saw Nathanael approaching, he said, "Here truly is an Israelite in whom there is no deceit."

"How do you know me?" Nathanael asked.

Jesus answered, "I saw you while you were still under the fig tree before Philip called you."

Then Nathanael declared, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the king of Israel."



St. Bartholomew (also known as Nathanael and whose feast day is August 24th) was one of the twelve Apostles mentioned in the Synoptic Gospels. Not much is known of St. Bartholomew. However, he is traditionally believed to have spread the Gospel to various regions, including Asia Minor, Northwestern India, and Armenia. And it was in Armenia that he was said to have been martyred, rather gruesomely, by being flayed alive and beheaded. Consequently, and not surprisingly, this accounts for him being the patron saint of various groups, including butchers, shoemakers, tanners, leatherworkers, and bookbinders. He is also a patron saint of the Armenian Apostolic Church, along with Saint Jude.

But back to the passage from John's Gospel. It reveals Bartholomew's blunt honesty. He is open about his doubts of any good coming from Nazareth, yet he does not hesitate in stating his belief when Jesus reveals himself. Perhaps this is why Jesus calls Bartholomew "an Israelite in whom there is no deceit."

Does Bartholomew reflect the qualities that Jesus encourages? 'Honesty, truth seeking, sincerity and thoughtfulness'. Was it these characteristics that allowed Jesus to come into Bartholomew's life and build trust with him? As a result, was Bartholomew better able to open to new perspectives and reflect on spiritual matters?

What do we learn from Bartholomew's example? Is it that we can come to know God better in prayerful reflection?
